- **Staff & Faculty:** As they continue to serve sacrificially, pray that they would continue to lead and teach with wisdom and vision.


### **ACCREDITATION UPDATE**

We are pleased to announce that the Bureau of Private Postsecondary Education (BPPE) has renewed approval for UUC to operate as a degree granting school in the state of California. This gives UUC state approval for the work that UUC is doing in providing a good education. It was a major task that was accomplished by the hard work of our California staff.

We have also received news that UUC's Self-Evaluation Report for accreditation was reviewed and that we are reasonably prepared to move on in the process! This does not mean that UUC is accredited but it is one major hurdle on the way to accreditation. Accreditation by a government approved agency ensures that an educational institution meets certain standards and is now required in the State of California for degree granting institutions. If we are successful this will be a great accomplishment and will bring greater credibility to UUC's work. We invite you to pray for the staff during this long and difficult process.

### **MEET BILL DITEWIG, VP of Operations & COO**

Mr. Bill Ditewig is one of our newest staff members, however, he is not new to Union. He has served as a past board member and more recently during 2013-2014 before coming onto staff. 

## DEVOTION: "Maybe She Had It Figured Out"

*"She said, 'Grant that one of these two sons of mine may sit at your right and the other at your left in your kingdom.'" (Matthew 20:21)*

I usually think of Jesus traveling around with his 12 disciples, gathering crowds large and small, and interacting with individuals as they cross his path. I think of the 12 disciples as the ones who most consistently hear his teachings and witness his actions.

So the sudden appearance of the mother of James and John in Matthew 20:20-22 is a little surprising. Where did she come from? How long has she been there? Matthew has not mentioned the family of James and John since their call to follow Jesus in chapter 4. And in that story Matthew mentioned their father but not their mother.

Now here she is, appearing right after Jesus again tells the 12 disciples that he will be betrayed, condemned, mocked, flogged and crucified, and on the third day be raised to life.

Usually her request in behalf of her sons is treated by Bible commentators as insensitive, inappropriate and selfish. The commentators assume she is requesting a place of high privilege for her sons. That is also how the other 10 disciples react when they hear about her request. "They were indignant" Matthew says. And Jesus has to tell them again that being great in the kingdom of God is not about having privilege and exercising authority over people, but rather about being a servant to others in imitation of Jesus, who gives his life as a ransom for many.

But what if she had been with Jesus and his disciples for a long time, listening, learning, comprehending, understanding? Women had no place in the competition for power in the culture of Jesus' time. And through their own life experience, women often had a better understanding of injustice and suffering. She might have had better "ears to hear" the words of Jesus than the men around her.
